The International Images Film Festival for Women is back again for its 22nd edition, running from 22 to 26 August. We are excited to bring you a line up of women centred films with the theme 'Women Make The World A Better Place'. The theme draws attention to how women remain resolute in their pursuit of a better world for themselves and their communities by being brave and courageous, by claiming their rightful places in economic activities, by demanding justice, and by taking leadership in order to challenge a repressive patriarchal world that has brought horrors like planet-destroying climate change and a resurgence of racism and gender discrimination into our world.

In these times, creative and cultural industries are chronically underfunded. Producing the 2025 edition of IIFF has been no mean feat. I'm grateful to all the filmmakers whose work we screen over the next few days. I invite everyone to enjoy our programme of fifteen films that range from short fiction, to long and short documentaries and long fiction, all carefully selected from around the world. Two industry masterclasses complement the screenings. A documentary production masterclass takes place on Saturday 23 August, and a film business masterclass takes place on Sunday 24 August. Details are in this programme.

IIFF is thankful to be in a position to continue its contribution to realising SDG 5: End all forms of discrimination against all women and girls everywhere for yet another year. Telling stories of violence and harmful practices against women and girls and making such actions public works towards SDGs 5.1 and 5.2. Leadership only comes with public presence. IIFF, a woman founded, led and run organisation puts women firmly in the public space. This contributes to SDG 5.4 and encourages other young women to occupy public spaces. The creative industry is now a growing economic sector globally. IIFF is a platform for training and solidarity for women in the film industry, which also includes the use of technology in women's empowerment, as set out in SDG 5.B.

The poetic short film "Home" follows a young Kenyan girl Adhis' relationship with her body.

It begins in the past, weaving through a time in Africa where a woman's body housed joy, confidence and was celebrated in dressing and dance. This joy continues in Adhis' childhood as she discovers her love for the outdoors, only to be interrupted by her mum who introduces a bright red shame and makes Adhis more conscious of her body. At school, teenage Adhis is desperate to love her body again, but this time shame is introduced by the Catholic sisters, and schoolmates who view her with a male gaze, even when they are female. Finally, Adhis breaks free.

She creates most of her own story concepts for the newspaper and believes her working class background allows her to relate more easily to her subjects - she covers difficult issues and engages with her subjects at a profound level of intimacy, revealing hauntingly beautiful photographs of her subjects at their most vulnerable. And then there are the beautiful photos of her children, which she started taking during COVID...



Both women embark on their own path to overcome the death of their loved one, although... at different tempos. Anabel tries to go through the pain, to cope with it and face an irreplaceable loss. Delia, instead, buries the tragedy by covering it under hours of work in the cab she drives as if nothing had happened. One day, they receive threatening letter notifying their own eviction: the apartment where they have lived in all their lives must be vacated. This news will put in danger their fragile economy and will confront them against a hostile world in which care and grief will be banished to an obscure second place. In the midst of this uncertainty, the two of them will have to find a way to support each other, hold one another's hands, and go through this painful yet necessary process called mourning.

Their path is fraught with challenges: a car is stolen, savings are lost, they have to flee from the police and they face discrimination. But their love for each other and Daye's extraordinary talent help them to get through. They also receive help from unexpected quarters, including a friendly firefighter - and an inspiring encounter with Mounir himself. Daye is a story about resilience, hope and the power of music. It explores themes of identity, ambition and the unbreakable bond of family, showing how determination and love can triumph over adversity...

Siobhán Cleary is an award-winning Director, writer and producer, her social and political feature documentaries for Channel 4, have received international recognition. The truth lies in Rostock her feature documentary commissioned by Channel 4 UK, was broadcast throughout Europe, winning the prize of the international jury at the international documentary festival Cinema Du Reel.

Recently reviewed by Journeyman Press was the ground-breaking investigative documentary Battle of Trafalgar, Channel 4 UK, which is "...Still regarded as one of the UK's most important documentaries." The documentary won the Prix Du Public prize at the International Festival of Documentary Nyon. Recently launched for international distribution is a current short historical documentary, funded by the Global fund for women in the USA, the documentary, If we can dance is the story of feminist activists in Kosovo. Launched at the Green Shoots Film Festival was a short documentary, We can, on international eco-feminists Women's Earth and Climate Action Network directed by Siobhán Cleary.

Currently she is engaged in the development and production of international documentaries and feature films: In Ireland, the feature film Sisters of the Revolution, and The Blind Swimmer.

Her feature documentaries and dramas have been internationally commissioned by broadcasters, Channel 4 UK and internationally broadcast on ARTE, ZDF and SBSTV Australia.

Alba Bosch-Durán graduated in Audiovisual Communication from UPF in 2015 and was awarded the 'Global Cities' scholarship to study a term at UCLA, where she specialized in film project development.

In 2016, she joined Oberon Cinematogràfica, a long-established production company, as a development producer. There, she worked closely with creative teams on scriptwriting, financing, and project planning. Some of the notable projects she contributed to include Petra by Jaime Rosales, selected at the Cannes Directors' Fortnight, and the series Vida Privada by Silvia Munt, shot in Cervera and awarded the Gaudí for Best TV Movie.

Her first feature film as a development producer was A Thief's Daughter (La hija del ladrón) by Belén Funes, which premiered in the Official Selection at the San Sebastián Film Festival. The film earned Greta Fernández the Silver Shell for Best Actress and established Belén Funes as Best New Director at the Goya Awards.

From 2018 onward, Alba took a step forward, becoming executive producer at Oberon Media, where she truly defined her style: committed to emerging talent, fresh narratives, and international co-productions. Highlights of her work include:

- · Las Buenas Compañías by Sílvia Munt (Spain-France), premiered at Málaga 2023 and winner of the Youth Jury Award.
- · La Abadesa by Antonio Chavarrías (Spain-Belgium), premiered at the Málaga Film Festival.
- Miralles, a documentary by Maria Mauti written by Sara Mesa (Spain-Mexico co-production), premiered at DOK Leipzig, Ji.hlava, the Málaga Festival, and DocsBarcelona.
 - Campolivar, a short film by Alícua Moncholí, winner of Best Short Film at Gijón Film Festival 2024.
- Los Tortuga (The Exiles), the second feature by Belén Funes, selected for the Berlinale Talent Project Market 2021 and premiered at the Toronto Film Festival 2024 and Málaga 2025, where it won Best Director, Best Screenplay, and the Jury Prize.

Alba is an alumna of the Rotterdam Producers Lab, Berlinale Talents, and EAVE Puentes.

Currently, she works as a freelance producer in Fractal Films and is a production mentor in the Acció Viver program by Dones Visuals, also she volunteers on the board of the association as treasurer.
